

Communication and Language

Children will:

- Explore and develop the skills needed to be a good listener by following Lola's listening rules.
- Develop conversational and language through engaging conversations with adults.
- Develop and broaden their vocabulary based on their experiences and through books read to them.
- Enjoy a wide range of quality texts and join in with songs and rhymes.

Reading

Children will:

- Develop a love of reading and books
- Have stimulating story time sessions with high quality texts.
- Can talk with interest about the stories that have been read to them.
- Receive their first home reading book

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Physical Development



- Develop their self-care skills, such as going to the toilet and washing and drying hands independently.
- Develop overall body strength and core muscle strength to achieve good posture.
- Develop their fine motor skills so they can use a range of tools competently, including pencils for writing
- Use cutlery correctly when eating
- Learn the importance of overall health.



Autumn Term

Personal, Social and Emotional Development



Children will:

- Build constructive and respectful relationships with adults and children.
- Begin to express their feelings and with support identify and moderate their own emotions
- To adapt to school expectations and routines.

Writing



Children will:

- Be encouraged to explore mark making and give meaning to their marks.
- Develop their letter formation memorising the rhymes to help them form the letters.
- Develop an awareness of initial sounds, write initial sounds to label pictures.
- Practise name-writing.



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Autumn Term

Phonics

ee ur ow wh y au

Children will:

- Begin daily Little Wandle phonics sessions introducing Phase 2.
- Continue exploration of rhyme and alliteration and oral blending
- Be introduced to blending for reading and segmenting for writing.
- Practise reading and writing daily in their Little Wandle phonic sessions.

Mathematics



Children will:

- Match and sort amounts using loose parts and everyday objects.
- Count objects and actions to 5 in a variety of ways and match the number name to amounts.
- Explore different representations of numbers to 5.
- Learn to subitise to 5
- Compare numbers to 5
- Understand one more and one less to 5.
- Use language of fewer and more than.

Understanding the World



Children will:

- Engage in conversations about themselves and their families.
- Comment on images of familiar situations from the past.
- Recognise that people celebrate different special times in the same and different ways.
- Describe what they see, hear and feel while outside.
- Observe the changing seasons.

Expressive Arts And Design



Children will:

- Develop their colour mixing techniques
- Be taught how to use tape to join materials.
- Be taught the purposes and use of different types of glue and tape.
- Use a range of props to support their imagination.
- Build up a repertoire of songs.
- Explore a range of musical instruments.

Homework

Children will bring home their first reading book. In addition to this we will ask parents to help at home with:

Sharing the school dinner menu from the school website, to prepare your child's decision making each day.

Encouraging your child's independence in cutlery skills for lunchtimes, dressing/undressing, handling clothes fastenings etc.

Encouraging name recognition skills to identify their belongings.



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Spring Term

Communication and Language



Children will:

- Use talk for a range of purposes, to organise thinking and activities etc.
- Continue to build and use new vocabulary.
- Use past and present forms accurately when talking about events that have happened.
- Retell well known stories to each other
- Build familiarity and understanding with stories and texts through talk.

Physical Development

Children will:

- Develop overall body strength, coordination, balance and agility.
- Refine a range of ball skills.
- Continue to develop fine motor skills to us tools competently and safely.
- Know and talk about different factors that support their overall health and wellbeing.

Reading





- Continue their enjoyment of reading new and known stories—joining in with known books.
- Segment and blend sounds to read cvc words, phrases and captions.
- Read longer-syllabic words using phase
 3 sounds
- Read phase 3 common exception words.
- Retrieve information from books, and webpages through shared reading.
- Develop their understanding of stories by talking with others about key events, characters, themes etc.
- Use talk to describe the main events in the story.
- Begin to enjoy an increasing range of books.

Personal, Social and Emotional Development





- Show resilience and perseverance when challenged.
- Think about the perspectives of others when organising activities and games.
- Manage their own needs such as good hand hygiene.

Writing





- Hold a short sentence independently by repeatedly saying it out loud.
- Use phonic knowledge to write for meaningful proposes such as letters, memos, lists and messages.
- Form lowercase letters correctly.
- Begin to re-read what they have written to check it makes sense.





Mathematics

Children will:



- Recognise zero.
- Explore numbers to 10, matching numeral to amount.
- Recognise and identify numbers to 10 quickly when shown.
- To begin to subitise to 5
- Explore the composition of numbers to 10.
- Compare numbers to 10 using vocabulary such as more than less than.
- Explore 3D shape and pattern
- Explore measures such as capacity, mass and length.

Expressive Arts and Design

Children will:

- Watch and talk about arts/musical performances.
- Develop storylines in the pretend play.
- Explore and engage in music-making, dancing and performing.

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Spring Term

Phonics

Children will:

- Begin Little Wandle Phase 3 phonics sessions
- Apply their phonic knowledge to read words, captions and simple sentences.
- Apply their phonic knowledge to write words, phrases and short sentences in meaningful contexts.

Understanding the World

Children will:



- Compare and contrast characters and settings/places in stories and books.
- Explore the natural world around them and recognise environments that are different to their own.
- Explore the effect of changing seasons.



- Talk about members of their immediate family and community.
- Talk about similarities and differences between different religious and cultural communities in this country

Homework



In addition to the weekly reading book a set homework task will be provided. This may be a Literacy, Maths or Topic based activity related to current learning. Set on a Friday with an expectation for it to be completed within the week. Homework will be carefully selected in order to meet the children's current needs.




Communication and Language


Children will:



- Listen attentively and respond to what they hear with relevant questions, comments and actions.
- Participate in small group and whole class discussions, offering their ideas and explanations, using recently introduced vocabulary.
- Express their ideas and feelings about their experiences using full sentences, conjunctions and past, present and future tenses, with teacher modelling and support.

Reading





- Apply phonic knowledge to read aloud simple sentences and books which will include sound-blending and some common exception words.
- Be able to say a sound for each letter in the alphabet and at least 10 digraphs.

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Physical Development



Children will:

Gross Motor Skills:

- Negotiate space and obstacles safely, with consideration for themselves and others.
- Demonstrate strength, balance and coordination when playing.
- Move energetically, such as running, jumping, dancing, hopping, skipping and climbing.

Fine Motor Skills:

- Hold a pencil effectively in preparation for fluent writing, using the tripod grip.
- Use a range of small tools, including scissors, paint brushes and cutlery
- Begin to show accuracy and care when drawing



Summer Term

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

Children will:



- Show understanding and sensitivity towards their own feelings/needs and those of others, and behave accordingly
- Be confident to try new activities and show independence, resilience and perseverance in the face of challenge.
- To manage their own basic hygiene and personal needs, including dressing, toileting and understanding the importance of healthy food choices.
- Form positive attachments to adults and friendships with peers.
- Work and play cooperatively and take turns with others.

Writing





- Write recognisable letters, most of which are correctly formed.
- Apply phonic knowledge to spell words by identifying the sounds in them and representing the sounds with the correct letter or letters.
- Write simple phrases and sentences




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Summer Term

Mathematics





- Have a deep understanding of number to 10.
- Subitise (recognise quantities without counting) up to 5.
- Automatically recall number bonds up to 5 (including subtraction facts) and some number bonds to 10 (including double facts)
- Verbally count beyond 20
- Explore, compare and represent quantities and patterns up to 10, including more than/less than, evens and odds, double facts and how quantities can be shared equally.

Understanding the World Children will:



- Talk about the lives of the people around them and their roles in society.
- Know some similarities and differences between things in the past and now.
- Explore, describe and compare their immediate and natural environment using observations, discussions, stories, non-fiction texts and maps.
- Know some similarities and differences between different religious and cultural communities in this country.
- Explain some similarities and differences between life in this country and life in other countries.

Expressive Arts And Design



Children will:

- Safely use and explore a variety of materials, tools and techniques, experimenting with colour, design, texture, form and function
- Share their creations, explaining the process they have used
- Make use of props and materials when role playing characters in narratives and stories
- Invent, adapt and recount narratives and stories with peers and their teacher.
- Sing a range of well-known nursery rhymes and songs
- Perform songs, rhymes, poems and stories with others, and, when appropriate, try to move in time with music.

Phonics

Children will: Wh y au

- Phase 4 phonics—CVCC, CCVC words.
- Consolidate reading and writing phase 4 irregular words.
- Apply their phonic knowledge to read simple words, captions and sentences.
- Apply their phonic knowledge to write a variety of sentences.

Homework
